

# Netflix spent over \$150M, hired over 1,600 cast and crew in New Mexico

NEW MEXICO (KRQE) – On Wednesday, the New Mexico Economic Department reports that since signing an agreement to open its first U.S. production hub in New Mexico, Netflix has spent over \$150 million in the state. Economic Development Cabinet Secretary Alicia Keyes also announced Netflix has hired more than 1,600 cast and crew members and have utilized over 2,000 production vendors in the state.

In January 2019, the streaming giant which is based in Los Gatos, California signed an agreement that allowed Netflix to purchase Albuquerque Studios and promised \$1 billion in production spending over the next 10 years. In return, the State of New Mexico and City of Albuquerque would provide economic development assistance.

### Amazon to build massive fulfillment center in Albuquerque

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (KRQE) – Amazon is coming to New Mexico. The retail and shipping giant is ilready building a massive fulfillment center in Albuquerque, likely bringing around 1,000 jobs to the Albuquerque area. Bernalillo County officials say construction is already underway for the 465,000-quare-foot, multi-level fulfillment center.

I'his is huge news for New Mexico and it really came as a surprise happening without the very public bidding wars that usually take place between cities when Amazon announces a new center. Bernalillo County Commissioner Debbie O'Malley says at the beginning of this year, Amazon approached Bernalillo County, and talks began about building a facility in Albuquerque.

### COMMERCIAL REAL ESTATE

- Future market uncertain with COVID third wave predicted
- On a positive note for ABQ federal government contractors, healthcare, and defense related companies were the most active industries in H1 2020, pushing our overall direct vacancy rate DOWN to 15.5%

### **WORK FROM HOME**

- About 43% of the United States' labor force is able to transition to telework
- Telework is feasible for 63% of workers with a bachelors or graduate degree whereas that number drops to 24.7% for workers with only a high school degree
- Home offices and remote work will be a permanent reality, at least partially
- Interest rates are projected to stay low for the next couple of years; opportunity to expand housing stock




